Nursing is a dynamic profession that requires competent, confident leadership. Incorporating contemporary leadership principles will help shape your professional identity and growth.

Leadership styles

- Authoritarian: leader makes decisions without staff input
- Laissez-faire: hands-off approach with leader providing little direction
- **Democratic:** focus on open communication and feedback
- **Transactional:** focus on rewards & punishments
- **Transformational:** leader inspires/motivates to innovate
- **Servant:** puts empowerment of employees first
- Authentic: focus on authenticity and ethical convictions of leader
- Visionary: similar to transformational; focus on future

A key leadership skill is effective communication.

Communication in nursing is the exchange of information, feelings, and meanings between nurses and clients or other team members.

Communication types

- Verbal: oral: can include tone of voice
- Nonverbal: facial and body expressions

Impact of good leadership and communication

- Prevents patient safety errors and improves quality of
- Contributes to patient and staff satisfaction
- Aids in conflict resolution

There are 2 types of leaders:

- Formal (due to role/position in hierarchy)
- **Informal** (e.g., an experienced team member).
